Parents, Guardians and Hawks,

Each year as we turn the corner into September, we all begin to settle into the routine of school. Procedures and processes are in place and it is great to see each day running smoothly so our teachers and students can put all of their focus into instruction and learning. Thank you to everyone who has attended the VRA Curriculum Chats for Grades 3-5 and Middle School over the past week. Curriculum Chats for Kindergarten -2^{nd} grade will take place on Thursday, September 6^{th} from 6:00 to 7:00 pm. These informative nights are great opportunities to learn more about the grade level expectations and curriculum for the 2018-2019 school year. If you still have specific questions after attending the Curriculum Chats or the K-5 Intake Conferences, I would highly encourage you to reach out to your child's teacher to schedule a parent-teacher conference.

The School Advisory Council (SAC) is seeking participants that would like to participate in monthly meetings with the principal and an appropriately balanced number of teachers, staff, parents, and community members. The SAC is a diverse group of stakeholders of a school with the shared goal of increasing student achievement in a safe learning environment. SAC members will participate with school improvement planning, school improvement funds, and school recognition funds. Eight meetings will be held during the school year and will occur the 2nd Tuesday of each month at 3:30pm in the Media Center. Our first SAC meeting is scheduled for Tuesday, September 11. Six times a year for K-8, we recognize and honor an exceptional student from each homeroom who demonstrates the character trait we are celebrating. While middle school Character Counts! celebrations do not include parents, K-5 celebrations invite parents to attend. However, this year's procedures for the K-5 Character Counts! celebrations have changed. Staff will check identification of all adults attending the event. Each adult must also have clearance to enter the building and attend the celebration. To be cleared to enter the building, please complete the Volunteer School Access form on the VRA main webpage. If you already have clearance, please do not submit an application.

If your K-5 student is nominated for a Character Counts! award, you will receive an invitation which requires an RSVP. The deadline to RSVP will be one week prior to the event. VRA staff will print badges ahead of time in order to streamline the process for you. On the day of the event you MUST show ID at the cafeteria annex to receive the preprinted badge and enter the celebration.

Those who do not RSVP will be asked to go to the front office to sign in and receive a badge to enter the building. Adults who do not meet clearance criteria will not be permitted to attend the celebration. We are looking forward to honoring many of our students this year and look forward to seeing you there!



Student safety continues to be our top priority at Valley Ridge. We have had one fire drill already and our students learned the safe way to exit the campus in case of a fire. This week, we conducted our student safety training with the St. Johns County Sheriff's office as directed by the new state law, Senate Bill 7026. Students viewed training videos through appropriate age groupings, K-3, 4-5, 6-8.

Our students listened carefully and were taught the ALWAYS rules, which are available on the below website. They are to always listen to teachers and adults in our school if there is ever an emergency. Students asked great questions and had time to process with their teachers.

Our district, St. Johns County Sheriff's Office and our school is committed to the safety of our students. We discuss and practice our response to emergencies so that all of our students have the same instruction on what to do. Now is a great time for parents to reinforce this important student learning-"always listen to your teachers and the adults around you in the event of any emergency. They are here to help you."

Volunteer Clearance

In an effort to provide safety and security to our students and staff, we check identification for all vendors, visitors, volunteers and parents each time you enter the building. Volunteers must have clearance to enter the building. If you have not already been cleared, please submit a school access form. Please input full legal name (first, middle and last) on the application. If you already have clearance, please do not submit an application. Expired accounts will be rerun automatically.

What are Hawk Bucks?

Hawk Bucks are used to recognize students who demonstrate:

- Random or extraordinary acts of kindness
- Positive character traits
- Consistent effort over time to follow the Code of Conduct
- Significant self- improvements,
- Meeting stated goals/expectations, etc.

Now, not only are the students rewarded with the Hawk Bucks themselves, but also with what they can *do* with the Bucks. Students have options to use their Hawk Bucks immediately or to save them for something they are looking forward to (*thus also helping them learn important life skills*). They have opportunities to spend their Hawk Bucks on weekly items, as well as longer-term goals like admission into a special monthly activity or to purchase items at the monthly School Store.



Are the incentives & rewards given out fairly?

With regards to distribution of the Hawk Bucks, equity is also ensured there as well. A suggested list of behaviors and how much to hand out has been established to help staff maintain the equitable distribution of the Hawk Buck. However, it is ultimately up to the teacher/staff member's discretion as to how/when the cash is handed out.

Within those guidelines, it was important to protect the integrity of the Hawk Bucks - to ensure they wouldn't be given out more frequently to students with more behavior issues just to keep them from disrupting - while making sure that *every* student has equal opportunities to earn the cash. Teachers and parents agree - rewards shouldn't be given out for "every little behavior" that meets expectations; rather, *randomly* reward **consistency** and *immediately* recognize **great acts of character**. Likewise, students are encouraged to perform such acts because it is the right thing to do, **not for the reward**.

It was also important to protect the purpose of the Hawk Bucks, which is to recognize the *positive* acts and behaviors of students. So it was impressed that the Hawk Bucks should not be taken away from students as a disciplinary measure. Doing so would essentially "take away" the positive act that earned the student that cash to start with - and that defeats the purpose of PBIS.



Aren't incentives & rewards like "bribing" kids to behave?

No. Simply put, "bribing" means telling someone ahead of time that if they do what you want, you will repay them with something of value. To "reward" is to give someone something in return, especially in thanks for help or kindness or to repay effort or attention that is given. An "incentive" is a motivator - something that encourages someone into action.

PBIS is about *motivating* and *encouraging* students toward positive behavior while *recognizing* and *rewarding* appropriate actions, significant displays of good character, and marked effort and improvement toward personal and academic success.

Students are encouraged throughout their school day to demonstrate the behaviors that are expected within the Code of Conduct. More often, students are praised and verbally recognized and appreciated for their actions

rather than given a tangible reward. This promotes students to become motivated more by the internal feeling of doing the right thing (and the positive attention they will receive) than the external feeling of "getting something out of it."

Students know that they *may* be rewarded for certain actions, but not always. Further, they are constantly being taught that they should do the right thing, not because of the **possibility** of a reward, but because of the sense of pride they will feel at knowing they did a good deed (and the good feeling it gives to those who receive the goodness of those deeds.)
