

Welcome to new students and welcome back to VRA for 2019-2020!

KG Registrations - Beginning on March 1, 2019, you will be able to go online to Pre-register your Kindergarten (KG) student. There will not be any on-site registration dates. All KG registrations and required documents must be completed and uploaded via the Online Registration system. Please visit the Valley Ridge Academy website and go to the Registration Tab for detailed instructions.

Attention All 6th Graders - The Tdap immunization shot is required for all 7th graders and must be recorded on a Florida 680 form. As soon as your student receives this shot, the form can be brought to the front office, faxed (904-547-4095) or emailed (to paige.lange@stjohns.k12.fl.us) even if the student is still in 6th grade. Per district policy, all 7th grade students that do not have this shot will not be allowed to start school the year they are entering 7th grade. Please contact Paige Lange, Registrar at 904-547-4096 with any questions.

Rising 6th and 9th Graders - In preparation for middle and high school registrations, all rising 6th and 9th grade students will be required to update their residency items. This will be facilitiated through VRA's Online Registration system by uploading your residency documents. Information regarding this process will be sent out in the next few weeks. Here is a list of the items that will be required:

- 1. Mortgage Statement/Property Deed/HUD or Lease
- 2. Utility bill (FPL, JEA, TECO, Internet)
- 3. One more bill (Additional utility, cellphone statement, vehicle registration, insurance documents).

"Hacking STEM" Summer Camp

Summer, 2019

Campers will be mentored by UNF Students participating in intercollegiate, collaborative, and authentic STEM projects. Campers will have the opportunity to learn coding, hacking, and making skills in computer science, engineering, and advanced applied mathematics while building STEM tools to participate in grade-level-specific projects related to our STEP Lab Social Justice projects.

JUNE 3-7, 2019: (Grades 3-6) HACKING AGRICULTURAL RESOURCES

Elementary School students will be engaged in Hacking Stem Lessons, Minecraft Edu., and Lego Robotic lessons that will integrate STEM curriculum. Students will build trundle wheels, learn to interpret streaming data, and learn to build and interpret 3D models of drone photographic data. Students will construct actual organic gardens, thereby learning the math, science and technology associated with this task. We will give consideration for equitable food distribution and production in rural communities.

JUNE 10- 14, 2019: (Grades 6-9) HACKING WATER RESOURCES

Middle school students will be engaged in Hacking Stem Lessons, Minecraft Edu., and Lego Robotics, along with WozU drone and integrated STEM lessons. Students will build dissolved oxygen sensors and sonar equipment. They will learn to 3D model waterways and river bottoms- essentially conducting civil engineering projects.

JUNE 17-21 & 24-28: (Grades 9-12) HACKING MEDICAL RESOURCES

High School students will be engaged in Hacking STEM Lessons, and robotics-integrated STEM lessons. Students will build robotic hands, 3D- printed hands, and invent robotic 3D-printed assistive technology for specified individuals from our community.

The Summer Marine Science Program has extended the application process, as we still have some open sessions available! Calling all current fifth through seventh graders who love to be outdoors!

Applications can still be downloaded at any time from the website prior to April 19th at http://www-grms.stjohns.k12.fl.us/marinescience/. The link also will have a complete day by day curriculum for each grade level, parent information, and a video from last year's program.

Return the completed pre application to your child's science teacher who will turn it into the program. Once accepted, a final application will be mailed home within two weeks. Upon payment deposit and final application returned a confirmation of session letter will be mailed.

We currently ONLY have spots available in our third session, June 24, 25, 26, 27, 28, July 1, 2, 3. This is a perfect session to finish just before the Independence Day holiday. Small classes of 12-14 students are separated by grade level. All instructors in the program are St. Johns County School District teachers.

The Marine Science Program is a carefully designed experience for responsible students who are interested in learning about our local marine environments. Learning is "hands on" in the field with students kayaking, canoeing, boating, hiking, snorkeling, sailing, windsurfing, surfing, SUP, (stand up paddleboarding), etc.

Reminders from the Dean's Office:

SJCSD Student Dress Code

(2018-19 SJCSD Student Code of Conduct, pages 13-14)

The dress and grooming of St. Johns County Public Schools students shall contribute to the health and safety of the individual promote a positive educational environment and not disrupt the educational activities and processes of the school. Because inappropriate clothing worn by a student is detrimental to the school program, the wearing of garments suitable for school shall be encouraged. All faculty and administrative staff shall be on the alert to give positive guidance in these matters, without embarrassment to the student.

These rules on personal appearance of students are intended to enable the students of St. Johns County Public Schools to dress casually but reasonably. However, the school principal is the final authority with regard to the appropriateness of student dress. **Nothing in these rules shall be construed to pre-empt the principal's authority** to act in specific cases when, in the principal's judgment and discretion a student's dress threatens to disrupt the educational process or the good order and discipline of the school, or is otherwise inappropriate.

All Students

- Personal attire may be in the style of the day, but clothing that is immodest, revealing, or distracting in character is unacceptable. Clothing, piercings and accessories shall not be worn if they display profanity, violence, discriminatory messages, sexually suggestive phrases, advertisements, phrases or symbols of alcohol, tobacco or drugs or create a safety issue within the learning environment.
- Students are prohibited from wearing clothing that exposes underwear or that exposes body parts in an indecent or vulgar manner.
- Head coverings, including but not limited to, caps, hats, bandannas, and/or sunglasses, shall not be worn on campus unless required by a physician or authorized by school administration.
- Students must wear shoes that are safe and appropriate for the learning environment. Middle school and elementary school students must wear shoes that have a back or strap on the heel.
- Skirts, dresses, shorts, baggies, no shorter than four inches (4") above the top of the knee, are acceptable. Skirts shorter than four inches (4") above the top of the knee worn with tights are not acceptable.
- Leggings and yoga pants are acceptable but must worn with a shirt, dress or skirt that reaches fingertip length.
- Graffiti (i.e. profanity, violent or discriminatory images, sexually suggestive phrases or symbols, or symbols of alcohol, tobacco or drugs) will not be drawn or worn on backpacks, notebooks, folders, yearbooks, papers, clothing or any other object or on the body of any student or person on school property.
- Sleeveless shirts and tank tops are not acceptable.

Standards: Boys

- Boy's pants/slacks must be worn at the waist. No boxer shorts or underwear may be visible.
- Shirts must cover the entire shoulder.

Standards: Girls

- Tops and shirts must cover the entire shoulder and may not be revealing or distracting. Midriff or "cutout" dresses and "cut out" tops may not be worn. Skirts must be no shorter than four inches (4") above
 the top of the knee. Revealing clothing, pajamas and lingerie are not acceptable. Undergarments must
 not be exposed.
- Girls' pants/slacks must be worn at the waist. No underwear may be exposed.

Cell Phones and Electronic Devices

The use of electronic devices, such as cell phones, electronic readers, hand-held video games, etc. is prohibited during school hours.

- If such items are brought to school, they must be placed in the student's locker, backpack or purse during the normal school hours. Items are to be **turned off**.
- Students may not use cell phones to make phone calls or text message during school hours. This includes
 during classes, between classes and/or lunch. Students found using their cell phones during school hours
 will have their phone confiscated. Repeated failure to comply will be considered defiance of school rules.
- If a phone call must be made, phones are available in the main office.
- Students may not use their cell phones as entertainment during the school day. This includes playing games, going online, checking time, etc.
- Students are not permitted to use camera phones for the purpose of taking pictures in school or on buses.

Cheating:

- If a student is caught using a cell phone or other form of technology to aid them in cheating, he/she will have the appropriate penalties for both cheating and cell phone use applied to them.
- Texting or checking texts during a test/exam will result in the student receiving a zero for the test/exam.
