Letter from our Principal

Hello VRA Families,

Congratulations to 5th grader **DEEKSHA HARIHARAN** and 6th grader **TIM GORELIK** for winning the 2020-2021 VRA Spelling Bee for elementary and middle school respectively. Deeksha and Tim will represent Valley Ridge Academy at the St. Johns County Bee on Wednesday, January 13th, 2021! Everyone at VRA is proud of your accomplishment and rooting you on!

Thank you to everyone for participating in the Annual VRA PTO Fun Run. Even though the structure of the Fun Run was different this year with students doing the DanceFit Challenge in their classrooms, the outpouring of support from the community was overwhelming. The students had a great time dancing and celebrating throughout the day on November 20th and it was wonderful way to go into the Thanksgiving holiday.

One of the unique challenges this year has been having to deal with the quarantining of individuals due to being a contact with a positive COVID case. The school district continues to work with the CDC and the Florida Department of Health (DOH) on ensuring all guidelines are followed and that we continue to adapt to an ever-changing situation. The following is the most up-to-date information related to the length quarantine and the process for returning.

ASYMPTOMATIC CLOSE CONTACTS IN THE SCHOOL SETTING

The CDC and the Florida DOH continue to recommend quarantine for 14 days from the date of exposure. However, there is new guidance that allows for a close contact to return to school earlier. There are two options that may allow the close contact to return to school/work before the full 14-day quarantine period has been met:

- The quarantine period may be shortened to 10 days from last exposure to
 the positive case if daily symptom monitoring indicates the close contact
 remains symptom free. The contact can return to school or work on Day
 11. HOWEVER, it is extremely important that the contact continues daily
 monitoring for signs/symptoms through 14 days, as well as, practice social
 distancing, always wears a mask, and washes hands frequently. If
 signs/symptoms develop at any point, the contact should immediately
 isolate, seek medical care, and call the DOH.
- 2. The quarantine may be shortened to as few as 7 days if a negative PCR test result is obtained on day 6 or later from exposure to the positive case. A PCR test is required and a rapid antigen test CANNOT be substituted. The test must be collected on day 6 or after, and if it is negative, the contact can return on Day 8 of quarantine, if he or she remains symptom free. HOWEVER, it is extremely important that the contact continues

daily monitoring for signs/symptoms through 14 days, as well as, practice social distancing, always wears a mask, and washes hands frequently. If signs/symptoms develop at any point, the contact should immediately isolate, seek medical care, and call the DOH.

FAQs:

DO I HAVE TO GET MY CHILD TESTED?

No, assuming your child remains symptom-free, he or she does not need a negative test to return to school on Day 11. If they develop symptoms you should seek medical care and call the Health Department.

HOW DO I GET PCR TESTING?

- You can obtain PCR testing through your medical provider.
- You can obtain PCR testing at a public testing site.
- REMEMBER: the rapid antigen test is not accepted, it must be a PCR test.
- If your child develops symptoms, seek medical care and call the DOH.
- Make sure results can be provided within 24 to 48 hours. If the results are likely to take longer than 48 hours, it may be better to quarantine through day 10 and return to school on day 11, if no symptoms. CHILDREN WITH A KNOWN PENDING TEST RESULT SHOULD NOT RETURN TO SCHOOL.

IF I GET A NEGATIVE PCR TEST RESULT, OBTAINED ON OR AFTER DAY 6 FOLLOWING EXPOSURE, WHAT IS THE NEXT STEP?

Call the DOH to check if the result has been reported electronically in their system. If the result is reported, they will let the school know that your child may return, assuming they remain asymptomatic. If you have been notified that the result is negative but it has not yet shown up in the DOH system, you will need to provide a copy of the lab directly to the DOH. NOTE: Please DO NOT fax or drop off copies of labs without first contacting the DOH to make appropriate arrangements.

Students will be dismissed one hour early on December 18th at 1:45 pm. Winter break is from December 19th – January 3rd. Students and staff return to campus on January 4th. We hope you and your family have a wonderful holiday season and a safe and happy New Year!

Counselors' Corner

Ms. MacNaught will be going into 6-8th grade classes this month to talk about Human trafficking.

Objectives:

- Students will learn about control and manipulation that can result from an imbalance of power.
 Students will be aware of the potential dangers of being controlled by others as these tactics can be used by human traffickers.
- Students will understand that human trafficking can occur anywhere and to anyone, and it is even likely happening in their own community.
- Students will learn the definition and risks of human trafficking.
- Students will be introduced to a scenario that demonstrates risky situations and red flags shown by a teen in a vulnerable position.
- Students will learn how traffickers maintain control and the impact of trauma bonds will be reviewed.
- Students will learn methods of reporting suspected or actual human trafficking.
- Students will review how to advocate for themselves and others.

Ms. MacNaught will also be talking to 7-8th grade students about Dating Violence.

Per state statute and school board policy 5.26, the health curriculum for students in grades 7th through 12th shall include dating violence and abuse. The dating violence and abuse component shall include, but is not limited to the definition of dating violence and abuse, the warning signs of dating violence and abusive behavior, the characteristics of healthy relationships, measures to prevent and stop dating violence and abuse, and community resources available to victims of dating violence and abuse.
